Laos Projects 2018-2019

A short story to help us better understand what our support can bring, however minimal:

As every morning, a water seller, went to the river to fill 2 jugs of water. And then he went to the city to distribute this water to his customers. But one of the jugs was cracked and lost water. The poor pitcher feels inferior, so decides to confide in his boss: "You know, no doubt, that you are losing money because of me, because, being cracked, I am almost half empty when we come to town. Please, forgive me!"

The boss does not say a word, but a little later, he tells him, in turn: "Look at the right side of the road! You will see all the flowers that grew thanks to you! Yes, it is you who, every morning, watered this side of the road ... I had bought packets of seeds of flowers and I sowed them along the road, and you, without knowing it, you watered them each morning. Know that even if we are poor, God knows how to work wonders with the little we bring him ..."

Archbishop Albert LeGatt's Message for October 2018

Having recently returned from the annual plenary meeting of the Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops (#CCCB), Archbishop LeGatt spoke with us about the new document that received unanimous approval by CCCB members: *Protecting Minors from Sexual Abuse: A Call to the Catholic Faithful in Canada for Healing, Reconciliation and Transformation*. The CCCB document sets forth new guidelines for dioceses across Canada, outlining protocols to ensure, as much as it is possible, the prevention of these abuses from ever being perpetrated again. This document is the fruit of 5 years of intense collaboration with experts, professionals, and survivors of sexual abuse from a cleric, and aims to build on the original 1992 document. October 28th, 2018

Go; your faith made you well

The passage dealing with the healing of blind Bartimaeus is one of the most animated in the Gospel. It could easily be adapted by the media.

The evangelist has recorded this healing story to illustrate how Bartimaeus became a follower of Jesus. At the beginning, he desired to meet Jesus and shouted out: *Jesus, son of David, have mercy on me!* In other words, pay attention to me and grant my request. Though people in the crowd tried in vain to silence him, Bartimaeus was so loud that Jesus heard his cries and commanded them to clear a passage for him.



Then Jesus asks Bartimaeus to specify his request: *What do you want me to do for you?* Bartimaeus' response: *Rabbouni, (my teacher), let me see again.* Jesus' response acknowledged Bartimaeus' deep faith. Christ recognized the intensity of this blind man who continued to shout out to him. Christ replied: *"Go, your faith has made you well."* The recovery of sight and recognition of the blind man's faith indicated that his salvation involved much more than mere physical healing. Bartimaeus was cured, became a disciple and followed Jesus.

These passages enable us to see that, even before his cure, Bartimaeus believed in Christ and was a potential disciple. The passage ends with this description of this disciple's actions: *Immediately the man regained his sight and followed Jesus.* Jesus had extended the same invitation to the Twelve: *"Come, follow me."* When Bartimaeus expressed his request to Jesus, he called him *Rabbouni*, which translates as "My Teacher." There is also evidence of Bartimaeus' detachment since he threw off his cloak as he approached Jesus. This cloak was all that had to wear and according to the Law, it was returned that evening. Bartimaeus' complete detachment exemplified what is required of a disciple.

Just as happened with Bartimaeus, I ask the Lord to open my eyes so that I may discover how precious He is and respond to his invitation to follow him.
