The holidays is a time for memories and remembering, but it is not always a happy time. Sometimes we can feel very much alone in the midst of the celebrating. We need the space and time to acknowledge our sadness and concern. We need to know that we are not alone.

For these reasons, the St-Claude Catholic parish will offer Candlelight Memorial Services on Sunday, January 12, 2020 at 2:00 pm at the St-Claude Church. Come out and share with us in a time of remembrance. Assisting will be Adam's Funeral Home. The service will be followed by a time of light refreshments and fellowship. Everyone is welcome.

Inspiring Hope

Faith, as shared in Church, opens onto a vast and hopeful horizon as we anticipate Christ's return. Despite whatever tribulations we endure, our Church encourages us to focus on a future far beyond our past and present circumstances. Christ took on our human flesh, suffered, died for us and rose from the dead two millennia ago. As we prepare for Christmas, we renew



our commitment to maintain our faith as St. John the Baptist told his followers: *Even now the axe is lying at the root of the trees; every tree therefore that does not bear good fruit is cut down and thrown into the fire* (Mt 3:10).

As we celebrate Advent, we move beyond our present circumstances and hopefully anticipate our *future*. How did the authors of these biblical texts express these magnificent promises? There are a series of remarkable and inspiring images to support our desire to engage in the joyous expectation of Christ's return. This strategy is especially evident on this second Sunday of Advent. Many images from Mediterranean countries unveil our world's destination, according to God's plan. Here are some examples that anticipate the joyful transformations that are possible in our world.

In the first reading, the shoot that sprouts from the root of Jesse, David's father, proclaims a dramatic reversal of what could be expected. In biblical times, a tree was a treasure and a dead tree, a symbol of sin. I remember seeing a stump of an olive tree in an Italian orchard with a shoot which had produced a branch. This new life could become an olive tree and potentially last for a thousand years.

The prophet Isaiah prophesized the birth of a descendant of a royal family that people thought had ceased to exist. This descendant would be a man of God and a rallying sign for everyone. This king would symbolize and guarantee God's presence among his people. Hope was also reinforced by the images of wild and domestic animals that would co-exist peacefully on earth and enjoy a vegetarian diet. The world would then return to the harmony of earlier days.

The Gospel is also teeming with strong images. We learn details of St. John the Baptist's life in the desert: his clothes, food and agricultural references. He mentions the unproductive tree that is cut down and burned. He also uses the image of gathering wheat into the granary and burning the chaff at the end of the harvest. The image is clear: conversion leads to a sorting process, a final, definitive judgment and the growth that God has dreamed for our world.
