Launching of the Good Shepherd Campaign 2018

This week, Archbishop LeGatt is launching the 2018 Good Shepherd Campaign. This year's campaign is raising funds to support the formation for our seminarians, the ongoing professional development of our clergy and the Nathanael adult faith formation process. As an example, our archdiocese now celebrates one or two ordinations per year—a result from initiatives spearheaded by Archbishop LeGatt in 2012. Why should we give to the Good Shepherd Campaign?

While support of your parish is very important, it is also important to remember how vital the Archdiocese of Saint Boniface is to the life of all parishes. The formation supported by the Good Shepherd Campaign is invaluable to our entire faith community. The Diocesan Centre exists not only to care for the spiritual needs of approximately 113,000 Catholics who worship in its churches, but also to provide a source of social outreach. Pope Francis encourages us to reach out to people on the periphery of our Church. Together, we can do more than any one parish can do alone.

What if this is a lot for a family to handle right now?

A person's gift should be determined after prayer for God's guidance. We only ask that your parishioners consider a gift that reflects their financial capacity. Keep in mind that gifts may be pledged over several months. Each and every gift, no matter the size, is important!

How do the seminarians contribute to their formation? (*frequently asked question*) Seminarians pay their own tuition for their bachelor's degree in Philosophy. Seminarians recruited from other countries have obtained this degree <u>before</u> joining St. Peter's or St. Joseph Seminary.

How many parishes and chaplaincies are there in the Archdiocese of Saint Boniface?

In total, there are 87 parishes and chaplaincies. On average, priests serve one parish in Winnipeg or two to four parishes or chaplaincies in rural areas.

Following Christ's Lead

The passage from St. Mark's Gospel that we read in today's liturgy is one of the most intriguing. A young man asks Jesus what he must do to inherit eternal life. Jesus asked him if he kept the Ten Commandments, the Decalogue. He responded: *Teacher, I have kept all these since my youth*". St. Mark records that Jesus, looking at him, loved him and said, "You lack one thing; go, sell what you own, and give the



money to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, follow me." The young man did not have the courage to follow Jesus because he had great wealth.

The moral interpretation of this text is well known. It is about the attachment to wealth that impedes our hearts and prevents us from making bold choices. No one is completely free of financial concerns because they often determine our chances of survival in a money-based society.

However, Jesus' words address much more than the question of money. The text says that Jesus looked at him and loved him. For the young man, who was a potential disciple, this could have been the beginning of an intense, personal relationship with Christ. The young man replied that he already respected the Ten Commandments. Jesus, God's Word, invited him to go further. However the young man was not able to make that choice and commit to Christ.

Many people keep the Ten Commandments. Choosing to leave their wealth behind and following Christ is the next step.
