#### Implementation of the new phrasing of Our Father (in French)

At the annual meeting of the French Sector in September 2018, the Catholic Bishops of Canada of the Latin Rite decided that, **as of the first Sunday of Advent (December 2, 2018)**, the new French translation of the Our Father will officially replace the old version in all its public liturgical form. # Generosity and compassion

Today's comforting pages from the Bible warm our hearts at the beginning of this cold season. These pages remind me of a Québec City organization, *La bouchée généreuse*, which was started by Fr. B. Verret. This organization added an important component to the faith-life of our city and relates to the biblical readings this Sunday. Two generous widows are praised by the Prophet Elijah and Jesus. In these exemplary cases, there was a lot at stake. Both women, inspired by their faith, offered what little they had. Despite a famine, the widow in the Old Testament



shared her meager reserve of flour and oil with others less fortunate. The poor widow in the Gospel contributed two small coins towards the maintenance of the Temple of Jerusalem. Despite their poverty, these two women offered what little they had. They are examples of faith and generosity.

I personally do not remember ever making such significant choices because of my faith. We are entering a season when we will be actively solicited to contribute to all kinds of good causes. There are many noble and heartfelt appeals that encourage us to lighten our wallets. At this time, our family budgets are often stretched to finance extra purchases for the Holidays. Despite tight financial resources, our ears and hearts remain receptive. Depending on our generosity, homeless shelters, community centers, respite foundations, the Saint-Vincent-de-Paul Society and emergency food banks will be soliciting donations to support their year-round operations.

What is encouraging during this season is that people enjoy contributing. Some community groups get involved weeks in advance to organize the logistics of food drives. Parents, school children and neighbors co-operate. We strategize the best ways to reach out to donors in their respective environments. We set up toll checkpoints on boulevards, go door-to-door to solicit donations to food banks and hold fund raising events for multiple good causes. Our imaginations are limitless.

The readings this Sunday invite us to go further than surface generosity. Christ asked us to question our motives. Why are we so happy to be generous? In recent years, recognition of one's philanthropy has been acknowledged and celebrated. Though some people may prefer to remain anonymous, I personally applaud the noble and historical causes that have generated so much support for those in need. I firmly believe that our Christian faith and outreach are excellent motivators to justify today's charitable practices.

As examples of generosity and faith are timeless, whether we read the Old Testament or today's Gospel, Christ recognizes people who go the extra mile for others. Jesus himself gave his life for us. Based on these precedents, we act out of compassion and generosity. Taking our cue from Jesus, our thoughtfulness proclaims the Good News and God's generosity.
