It is important that your children receive a religious education first at home, and then reinforced throughout their school years and the rest of their life. Marriages: Steps to Prepare Your Christian Marriage

Contact your parish **8 to 10 months before your planned wedding date**. Thus, you will be able to meet the priest or the Parish Life Director to begin concretizing your project. During this first meeting:

- 1. 1. You will be informed about the different marriage preparation sessions. You will be asked to attend one of these sessions before your wedding. You choose the form that suits you best. However, book early as space is limited, and you are not the only ones to get married especially during the summer!
- 2. Bring your baptismal certificates. They must have been issued in the last six months. You may have to bring them from the parish where you were baptized.
- 3. Plan at least three possible dates for your wedding. It may happen that the celebrant or church is not available on the date of your first choice.
- 4. If the celebration takes place in a parish other than the one where you reside, you must ask the written authorization of the parish priest of your parish. It's just a request to the parish office.
- 5. Shortly before the wedding, you will be invited to a special meeting for the prenuptial inquiry.
- 6. Finally, you will meet the priest or deacon to prepare for the celebration of your wedding.

The Effects of the Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation:

The whole power of the sacrament of Penance consists in restoring us to God's grace and joining us with him in an intimate friendship. *Reconciliation with God* is thus the purpose and effect of this sacrament. For those who receive the sacrament of Penance with contrite heart and religious disposition, reconciliation 'is usually followed by peace and serenity of conscience with strong spiritual consolation.' Indeed, the sacrament of Reconciliation with God brings about a true 'spiritual resurrection', restoration of the dignity and blessings of the life of the children of God, or which the most precious is friendship with God.

This sacrament reconciles us with the Church. Sin damages or even breaks fraternal communion. The sacrament of Penance repairs or restores it. In this sense it does not simply heal the one restored to ecclesial communion but has also a revitalizing effect on the life of the Church which suffered from the sin of one of her members. (*Ref. 23rd Sunday in Ordinary Time (C) - September 8th, 2019



As we all know, some expressions can make us laugh...Here are two examples: "I'm all thumbs"... and "That will cost an arm and a leg"...They cannot be interpreted literally, but we understand what they mean.



Take the original Hebrew expression: Whoever comes to me and does not hate his father and mother, wife and children, brothers and sisters, yes, and even their life itself, cannot be my disciple (Lk

14:26). This expression is not promoting hatred, but an important detachment. I appreciate a current translation: "If someone comes to me without preferring me to his father, his mother - he cannot be my disciple". It can be interpreted as a reasonable response to accommodation and relationships and we understand what Jesus means. Christ is serious about commitment!

In practice, Christ has issued a wake-up call to make significant decisions. We know that Saint Peter had a wife and mother-in-law. He understood the complexity of Jesus' words, just as we do.

Choosing Jesus means opting for true and inner freedom that has nothing in common with the apparent superficiality of life.

We should be proud and never forget that we belong to Christ and that through Him, we experience our most fulfilling existence. We are open to others, to the most vulnerable people, to those who are rejected and damaged by life.

It may seem hard to believe, but Jesus came to transform people into divine beings! While this may seem unfeasible even to consider, nothing is impossible for God! This is the great mystery of God's encounter with human beings by, with, and in his Son Jesus.

Jesus speaks to all of us, whether we are rich or poor, strong or weak, perfect specimens or challenged. What matters is the extent that we are willing to follow Jesus.

We should reflect on whether it is worthwhile to climb into Jesus' boat. Is following him as his disciple worth a few renunciations? While we read this text, remember that we count in God's eyes. As we celebrate Communion, we remember that we *are* God's Temple.
