NEW Bishop LeGatt Video Message – Let us Humbly and Actively Seek to Listen, First Since June 21st is National Indigenous Peoples' Day, Archbishop Albert reflects on the first and most urging action non-Indigenous people must take: humbly and actively listening to the experiences and wisdom Indigenous peoples share. Truly, we must together take action in the light of the recent shocking finding of those 215 unmarked children's graves on the site of the Residential School that once stood on Tk'emlúps

te Secwépemc First Nation, and of similar findings that have preceded it, including the systemic inequity continuing to be faced by Indigenous peoples in Canada. But the first and most pressing action non-Indigenous people must take is real, true, humble listening, in order to then affect to more concrete and lasting change. Especially now as the UN Declaration on Rights of Indigenous Peoples is set to soon become law in Canada, let us continue, together, to build the ways of healing, reconciliation, and peace.

Today's Gospel presents us with two miracles of Jesus. These miracles are evidence of the wish and plan of God for us his people. They also demonstrate that while Christ desires that we be freed from all forms of captivities, he equally wishes that we demonstrate a strong faith in order to step into our miracles. In both cases, we see faith in action. The woman demonstrated her living faith with her active action. She waited for twelve years, and

when her chance came, she took it in faith. She was not afraid or ashamed of the crowd. Her action and the reaction of Jesus, simply teach us that coming and touching Christ must be a very deliberate action motivated by a living faith. Also, Jairus demonstrated his faith on behalf of his daughter by persistently inviting Christ. Both Jairus and the woman never gave up, instead, they waited patiently until the plan of God was fulfilled for them.

Finally, we must learn first that, it is the plan of God for us to prosper both in body and soul, but we must be patient and walk into this plan in faith. Second we have a role to play in the plan of God towards others. This is why Paul tells us today: "You always have the most of everything…so we expect you to put the most into this work of mercy too." So, while Christ seeks our welfare every day, we too must constantly seek the welfare of others. Let us praise the lord saying: "I will praise you, Lord, you have rescued me."
