UPDATE Summer Chapels during the COVID-19 Pandemic



The faithful continue to gather to celebrate Sunday Mass in four of our summer chapels:

- Falcon Lake: Sunday at 10:30 a.m. (semi-bilingual)
 - Traverse Bay: Saturday at 7:30 p.m. and Sunday at 10:30 a.m.
 - Grand Beach/Grand Marais: Sunday mornings at 10 a.m. and every second Saturday at 5 p.m. (The next Saturday mass will be on August 7th.)
 - Albert Beach: Sunday at 10:30 a.m. (French)
- If a priest is not available, the community will organize a communion service.

Thanks to the relaxed health restrictions, there is no need to register ahead of time. However,

the faithful are asked to wear masks, to practice physical distancing, to wash or sanitize their hands, and to refrain from singing.

Unfortunately, the chapels at West Hawk Lake, Jessica Lake, and Barrier Bay remain closed.

COVID-19 Restrictions – Code Orange Alert Changes – In effect August 7, 2021



New Code Orange Alert restrictions for all of Manitoba come into effect on August 7. **Religious services open with 50 per cent of capacity or 150 people, whichever is lower. The gathering limit for funerals, weddings, baptisms and prayer vigils for the deceased increases to 50 people indoors and 1500 people outdoors. Masks are strongly recommended indoors for everyone who is not fully immunized, including children under 12.**

We are currently updating our COVID-19 Health Measures and Protocols for Religious Services document, pending the publication of the Provincial Public Health Orders, which will most likely occur on August 5.
