In September, Deacon Peter will leave us for his last year of training before his ordination in the spring of 2019. The intention of Bishop Le Gatt, with the acceptance of Deacon Peter, is that he will be appointed our parish priest as of August 1<sup>st</sup>, 2019 for a 6-year term. #### Deacon Peter's brief vocational story

Deacon Peter was born in a devout Catholic family of six children in the Archdiocese of Huế, Central Vietnam. His family played an important role in nourishing his faith and priestly vocation. He served his home parish as an altar boy when he was 10. After years of discernment, Peter entered Hue Seminary in 2008. He had finished the Philosophy program and the pastoral year in his home diocese. In 2012, during his visit to Vietnam, Archbishop Albert LeGatt invited him to continue his vocation for the Archdiocese of St. Boniface. Trusting in God's providence, he came to Canada in 2012 and started the Theology Program at St. Peter's Seminary, in London, Ontario. As part of the priestly formation, he had spent his pastoral year at Sts. Martyrs Canadiens. Archbishop LeGatt ordained him to the transitional diaconate last Tuesday, June 5th: the patronal feast of our Archdiocese.

God willing, deacon Peter will be ordained to the priesthood in spring of 2019. He is grateful to God and to those who support him in many different ways in his vocational journey. Let us give thanks to God and pray for Peter as he is among us serving our parish in the role of a deacon and continues his journey to the priesthood. Deo gratias!

# Birds build their nests here

The image is simple but powerful: *The kingdom of God is as if a man would scatter seed on the ground, and would sleep and rise night and day, and the seed would sprout and grow, without his knowing how...* (Mk 4:26-27). It could even become a tree. There is nothing ambiguous about this. The *Kingdom* is God's work that had modest beginnings and continues to unfold.

The lesson is important especially in view of the urgent invitation of our bishops: to meet the challenge of evangelization in the context of our *missionary crossroads*. Perhaps we should talk more about a right-angle shift when we consider their message in the realistic analysis of current situations. Religious practice is in



free fall. Churches are deserted, and we close and sell them. Mega-parishes are being created, bringing together several small communities. However, we must not confuse *parishes* with *communities*. The current situation of Christianity experienced in our province requires us to differentiate these two realities. Community practice and culture are different because the traditional *parish* first filled a leadership role in our Christian lives. It is not surprising when some people miss the traditional leadership role and have withdrawn, become silent, and feel a great loss and even hopelessness for the future.

In the Gospel today, Jesus' words are full of hope and good news. The challenge of evangelization, and more precisely, the *proclamation of God's Kingdom*, is as important today as in the past. When the first disciples left on their mission, they were fragile, hesitant, without means, *like sheep in the midst of wolves*. Christ's words encourage us to put everything in perspective. These circumstances are not different for us today.

We acknowledge that on certain days, our tasks will appear to be disproportionate. Human and financial resources are dwindling. Our voices may be weak in comparison to experienced adversaries. Yet things have not changed much from the days of the first missionaries and their adventures. As in the past, Jesus invites us to sow, remembering that a seed will sprout and grow by itself.

The prophet Ezekiel spoke words which Christ repeated: *I dry up the green tree and make the dry tree flourish* (Ezek: 17,24). Other words reiterate the same reality. The Lord remains the great administrator of his Kingdom and oversees its existence and growth. The Lord can take even the smallest mustard seed ... yet when it is sown it grows up and becomes the greatest of all shrubs, and puts forth large branches, so that the birds of the air can make nests in its shade... (Mk 4:32).

Inspired by St. Mark, these missionary challenges can be approached with hope.
