"Prepare the way of the Lord..." Mark 1:3

We are all called to live a holy life. We are all called to invite others to live holy lives. Living a stewardship lifestyle, being grateful and generous with our gifts, does just that – it puts us on the path to holiness and it invites others to be holy, too.

To believe is not to *have* a future; it is to *be* a future in the hands of God.

Second Sunday of Advent (B)

Believing in the Promise

The common theme in the readings this Sunday is the future. All verbs use this tense and our thoughts focus on what is to come:

Make straight in the desert a highway for our God…then the glory of the Lord shall be revealed (1st Reading: Is 40)

The Lord will give what is good, and our land will yield its increase (Ps 85)

In accordance with his promise, we wait for new heavens and a new earth $(2^{nd}$ Reading: 2 P 3).

The one who is more powerful than I is coming after me... He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit (Gospel: Mk 1)

These quotations do not encourage us to cease living in the present and take refuge in a hypothetical future. These words situate us before two principal elements in our lives: Experience and Promise.

Experience and Promise

Take for example a new born baby. The child has no experience: no competencies (can cry but can't speak); no bank account, no furniture, no house... But there is immense promise: a promise that the parents made for this child when he or she was born. They promised: "We will be here to nourish and guide you as you grow and achieve your potential."


As the child grows, he or she is exposed to new experiences through parents and schools. The child receives clothes, toys, and often becomes a digital native. Later the young adult begins to work and manage money. Very quickly the assets accumulate: furniture, cars, a home, maybe a chalet, etc. Perhaps also a pension fund, investments...

However, it may happen the more that adults accumulate, the less they remember their promise. Security becomes their priority. These acquisitions, which the adult protects and is fearful of losing, can create many anxious moments.

It is unfortunate when people have no more room for promise in their lives. Their existence shrivels and resides around things that cannot bring happiness or true security and makes their original promise a distant memory.

The horizon of our on-going promise

As believers, we dare to focus on the immense promise that exists in the horizon of our lives. That is what the desert, where St. John the Baptist lived, represents. It is the place where there are no acquisitions, where existence finds meaning in a promise as great as the sky, a promise that is God Himself.
