COVID-19 Vaccines - Moral Questions and Principles

Is it OK for a Catholic to be vaccinated against COVID-19? The short answer is: yes, it is.

Yet there are many reasons to ask this question. What could be wrong about a vaccine whose very aim is to save lives? As the Catholic Bishops of Alberta and the Northwest Territories put it in a December 2, 2020 letter to the Faithful, "the moral issue arises from the fact that vaccine development and testing often make use of cell lines derived from either the tissue of aborted fetuses or destroyed human embryos". At present, the current vaccines being shipped to Canada do not violate the Church's teachings. Still, we invite you to explore some resources that can help us all reflect and deepen our understanding of Catholic bioethics, as well as pray for the application of the best medical practices in fighting COVID-19. God's Word and Our Lives



At each Mass and celebration of the sacraments, we read passages from the Bible. Why then did Pope Francis dedicate a special Sunday to celebrate the Word of God? I believe this was done to make us appreciate the dynamic words which reiterate and emphasize God's gift to us. It is precisely to make us think beyond the uniformity of our daily routines...

The Biblical texts proclaimed at each celebration are not only traces of our history. They remind us of the incredible covenant between God and us and set possible scenarios in motion. This meeting of minds affirms that the time is ripe for something else. Our lives are changing because people just like us are following Jesus, God's messenger. In today's readings, Jonah and St. Paul acted on God's invitation to proclaim that the Kingdom of God was near. The effect of this initiative can be seen today in the work of missionary disciples whose journeys we are invited to join. Despite the ambient noise of our present concerns, lingering disappointments, and expectations, we are still invited to become disciples. The Word of God has a lasting effect on those who discover and receive it with joy and respect. This is what we now celebrate once a year with God's Word.

This Sunday's Gospel is striking as it relates the transformation of some *entrepreneurs* from Galilee into Jesus' disciples. They left everything behind and followed Him for the rest of their lives. It was quite a decision. When Jesus invites us, we must decide between our lives and our love of God. We bring a list of issues to consider that are first and foremost to our advantage. Obviously, we must respect our primary needs such as feeding and dressing ourselves, working and educating our children. Then decisions must be made when we are presented with or seek the opportunity to participate in a Christian activity. We may decline because of previous commitments or hobbies. Let's be frank with ourselves. *God* could become a secondary consideration as we may opt to choose our distractions. There is a lot to consider.

The Gospel tells us that the disciples followed Christ throughout their lives. There was no hesitation: no "maybe yes" or "maybe no". Jesus spoke clearly and influenced those whom he invited. Jesus transformed people into disciples who followed him to the end. These disciples were not satisfied with just *knowing* about God's love. Instead, they made the decision to dedicate their lives to Him as God's Word had become essential. Will we be among these disciples?
