Certainty in Uncertain Times

Few things are really constant in our lives. Yet, we can count on the beneficial cycle of rain and snow described in first reading. Just about everything else is often up to chance. There are many uncertainties in our daily lives that we can honestly say provide us with anxious moments, adjustments, deep setbacks and sudden advances. Even in the realm of faith, we often navigate through an uncomfortable fog. As St. Paul writes, we don't necessarily reach our goals as we survive the bad times and the crises of growth: We know that the whole creation has been groaning in labor pains until now; and not only the creation, but we ourselves, who have the first fruits of the Spirit, groan inwardly while we wait for adoption, the redemption of our bodies [Rom 8: 22-23]



This tension that exists between what is already here and what is not-yet here is reflected in a powerful statement from Jesus. He uses agricultural references which would be familiar to his followers who worked the land. Seeds that have been improperly sown will not bring forth positive results. The focus now turns to Christ's comforting message of encouragement and that the phenomenon of growth is possible but not necessarily sustainable. Having understood Jesus' images, we focus on his comforting message about positive growth. St. Paul could have also added that creation and positive forces ultimately will succeed and inspire us throughout our lives.

In Jesus' era, people understood that God's intervention was indis-pensable for the survival and progress of humanity. God was not perceived as exacting vengeance on mankind, as some modern and deluded *preachers* now state. God is our essential ally for our well-being. St. Paul's faith strongly expressed God's acknowledgement of our human realities and he issued this statement: *I consider that the sufferings of this present time are not worth comparing with the glory about to be revealed to us* [Rom 8:18]. This glory is evidence of our adoption by God and the result of our bond with Him.

God's gift might meet a lot of opposition. Because of this sometimes nasty feedback, there is a danger that we may too quickly fall into that trap and become fragile, manipulated, or otherwise resistant like fallow soil. Moving beyond these agricultural comparisons, and giving thanks to God, we focus on our progress, advances and strengths. We celebrate God's action at the heart of creation in His garden! May our trust and reliance on God's positive action change our view of the world and our lives...
