

Provocative words followed by ...

After his baptism in the Jordan River, near Jericho in Judea, Jesus returned to Galilee. He settled in Peter's house, in Capernaum, a small town on the shores of Lake Gennesaret, a location that was considered cosmopolitan. Christ's reputation as an itinerant preacher who taught at synagogues had preceded him. His fame had spread and he was praised and listened to with great attention. This did not happen in Nazareth, in the synagogue of the little village where Jesus grew up.

We recall that Jesus read a passage from the prophet Isaiah: *The spirit of the Lord God is upon me, because*

the Lord has anointed me; he has sent me to bring good news to the oppressed, to bind up the brokenhearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives, and release to the prisoners, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor (Is 61:1-2). Jesus used these words to explain his mission on earth. When we read the passage from St. Luke's Gospel, (Lk 4:21), we see it is the rationale for his prophetic mission. When we continue our reading (Lk 4:21-30), Jesus kept on answering his audience's questions: *Is this not Joseph's son?* Jesus' responses upset the crowd particularly when he reminded them about passages referring to the Prophets Elijah and Elisha who protected two non-Jews: a woman from Zarephath and a Syrian general called Naaman. The faith of these two pagans contrasted to the disbelief of the Nazarenes. Are we on board with Christ's missionary project and our own practices?

Christ's words call upon us to reflect on our actions. They force us to delve deep inside ourselves and to evaluate our understandings and intentions. Are we fulfilling or resisting the Gospel message? Sometimes we succumb to the temptation to choose what suits and disturbs us the least, at the risk of ignoring the prophetic and evangelical dimensions of our actions. We should not be surprised to discover this same inspiration exists in people who do not belong to our faith but also devote themselves both body and soul as caregivers. They are actively engaged in the promotion of justice, education, defense of the environment and other measures that serve humanity.
