The moral of the story is to love our neighbor. That means loving someone you may not know or someone that looks different than you or someone that you don't like. All without expecting anything in return.

When Jesus recounted the parable of the Good Samaritan, we can imagine that his listeners made derisive comments when he referred to how the Priest and Levite acted. True, they turned away and did not help the man who had fallen into the hands of bandits, but there is more to this story. Because of religious restrictions, the Priest and Levite could not touch the victim's blood. If they had, it would have made them unclean and unable to perform their duties in the Temple of Jerusalem! They made their choices.

The more things change, the more they remain the same... Workers of the third millennium may come up with a thousand excuses not to spend time with someone who is in distress ... maybe even someone in the next cubicle. Why? Perhaps getting close to someone in need could hinder their efficiency? The results of surveys on labor relations, published in journals and newspapers, indicate little time is set aside for conversations between fellow employees. This work-free interaction rarely exceeds 4% of the time spent in a day. Do coffee breaks still exist when we can discuss *real life* issues? We do not have time anymore. We may just briefly greet each other in the morning before responding to numerous emails from people we won't have time to meet!

In this energized atmosphere, how will we realize that a new employee is struggling to integrate? Who will notice that a colleague is suffering mental health issues? Who will share a young mother's happy moments? Who will share the anxieties of a father who does not know what to say to his rebellious teenager? Who will offer good advice to the caregiver who is at a loss to know how to help an elderly parent? The sharing of joys and sorrows helps individuals to be part of a community. By privileging efficiency, are we doing a disservice to ourselves?

In such a context, the Parable of the Good Samaritan is more relevant than ever. The Samaritan helped the stranger who had been robbed and beaten by highwaymen. He paid attention, opened up his *wallet* and paid for the victim's care. In our society, roles and functions are clearly defined. While we, personally, may not be able to provide medical and social assistance for someone, we can still reach out with advice as who to contact. We can hear and react to the distressing calls from people who are disadvantaged. Do we take the time to listen to someone who needs our assistance? If Jesus lived among us, would his parable include us among those who are insensitive to the misfortunes of their colleagues? Jesus would bring us elsewhere. One can be a good professional and, at the same time, be connected to others. God's law is explicit. In Deuteronomy we read Moses' words: [God's Word] ... it is very near to you; it is in your mouth and in your heart for you to observe. (Deut 30:14)
