Fourth Sunday of Lent

Signing Off ... to New Beginnings

Today you are reading our last message in your Parish Bulletins about the Sunday biblical texts. For more than fifty years, a team of faithful and far-sighted writers has paid close attention to Bible texts. The concern of this group of contributors remained constant: to offer you clarity and inspiration for your daily life while responding to your questions. We have reached the end of this adventure. It is largely due to a microscopic virus (Covid 19) which caused the end of this service that has appeared each week in hundreds of Parish Bulletins. By a curious reversal of situations of which only the Holy Spirit knows the reason, this

Sunday's readings turn us towards the future. It is a peaceful future, one in which we are not left to our own devices.

We belong to a spiritual people who have often encountered dark clouds without losing their souls. The amazing story of God's people is touched on in today's first reading. We may find it shocking with its details of destruction and deportations. Our reaction will change as soon as we consider the place of this text in the Jewish Bible. It is in fact a grand finale in the story of the history of God's people. This story ends with a future filled with hope. Though the Israelites had not been faithful, God never forgot them. In fact, a foreign king freed them and enabled them to rebuild the Temple and practice their faith again. As God's people and heirs, will we be able to recognize the new paths of continuity and progress that will present themselves to us in the coming months and years? Will we be able to move beyond this pandemic episode and become a Church more focused on essentials: our identity as God's family in this new world order?

In the second reading, we are offered God's treasure which overflows with hope. St. Paul describes the extent of God's mercy and infinite grace. The most essential impact of God's gift is Christ Jesus: ...for by grace you have been saved through faith... it is the gift of God ... For we are what He has made us, created in Christ Jesus for good works... (Ephesians 2:8). St. John's Gospel confirms the scope of these specific options. It is up to us to live connected to God and be rewarded with eternal life or to risk God's judgment upon us if we choose otherwise.

If we are reluctant to celebrate Sunday with the appropriate devotion and serenity, we may (perhaps) be impressed by the description of the bad fruits of "profaned sabbaths" in the first reading. If our lives appear dull, we will always find inspiration when we hear St. Paul describe our newly acquired dignity. If we find it difficult to see what a life of faith offers us, hopefully we will be impressed by the benefits proclaimed in the Gospel. For the people of the Bible, eternal life was not an escape from the world. Like the Hebrews in the desert, we will look evil in the eye and move past it. Eternal life is a reflection of our actual involvement in this life. This prospect of eternity invites us to remember the Scriptures where the Spirit encourages us to invest in ourselves. To all God's Children, I wish you a good spiritual journey!
