Words from Father Peter:

Brothers and sisters,

Some people shared with me that "we have never experienced this before". Yes, we are living in a unique time, coping with fear, difficulties and uncertainties. However, as people of faith, we believe that the Lord is always with us. The LORD is near to all who call on Him. Therefore, during this unique moment, I encourage you to spend more time to pray for the end to the Coronavirus pandemic. May the Lord heal us and grant us peace and help us to remain faithful to Him in all circumstances. I invite you to meditate on words of St. Paul in his letter to Romans:

"Who will separate us from the love of Christ? Will hardship, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or sword? No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us. For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Romans 8:35-39).



Fourth Sunday of Lent (A) March 22, 2020

A Disciple is Born



Blind from birth, a beggar stands close to the Temple not expecting to "see" his life turned upside down, following Jesus' intervention which he had not solicited. This is guite different from Bartimaeus, the blind man from Jericho, who attracted Jesus' attention by crying out: Jesus, Son of David, have pity on me...make me see. In fact, this anonymous beggar didn't even know who Jesus was. Yet, following his cure, he did not hesitate to find out everything about Jesus which he later shared with the Pharisees who interrogated him and sought to discredit his testimony.

When he became a disciple, the formerly blind man rendered a double service to Christ. It enabled him to disprove a general misconception that his blindness was the result of some sin. The formerly blind man now had proof that his disability was not guilt based. The blind man's cure was a sign that confirmed who Jesus was: the light of the world. Jesus was God the Father's envoy and through Him, we would be able to see God's love.

The first steps taken by the blind man on his pathway of faith (a pathway which potentially could lead to the cross) was his confident obedience to Jesus' order to go and wash himself in the pool of Siloam. When he came out of the water, a new man was born. He was able to see, but he had not vet seen the One who had cured him of his blindness. He would not know who Christ was until later during a dialogue with Jesus when he ultimately professed his faith: Do you believe in the son of man? ... And who is he, sir? Tell me, so that I may believe in him. ... You have seen him, and the one speaking with you is he. Lord, I believe. And he worshipped him.

At the end of a contentious interrogation by the Pharisees, the formerly blind man presented himself as evidence of Christ's divine identity.

In the final preparation for catechumens prior to their Baptism, the verses of the formerly blind man's pathway toward faith is one text used in the Second Scrutiny. The objective is to purify the hearts of those who will be baptized. At the end of this ceremony, the priest says this prayer during the imposition of hands:

Lord Jesus, true light that enlightens every person, deliver by the Holy Spirit of truth all those who are enslaved by the father of lies, awaken the good will of those whom you have called to your sacraments. Joining in your light, like the blind man whose sight you restored, may they become witnesses of faith, full of confidence and courage.
