Code of Conduct for Clergy

In August 2016, the St. Boniface Archdiocese adopted a new Code of Conduct for Clergy. It addresses counselling and spiritual direction, confidentiality, conduct with minors and vulnerable persons, sexual conduct, harassment and violence, use of information technology, and financial issues as well as clergy well-being. All priests and deacons must adhere to it. Raise your Eyes!

As cell phones are ubiquitous, we pedestrians face extra challenges and must always pay attention. We must be present, focused on our surroundings, careful where we walk, especially in winter, since we could easily slip on the ice. Secondly, we must be careful not to run into other pedestrians whose eyes are glued to a phone. These were not problems faced by the Magi.

According to the passage from St. Matthew, we know how the Magi crossed the desert. Their signposts were in

the night sky as they followed the star they had seen rising in the east. Their eyes remained focused on the horizon and they didn't lose their way. The Epiphany is a feast of enlightenment and revelation that commemorates Christ's glory as we read in Isaiah's beautiful prose. Abraham looked forward to the land promised by the Lord and raised his eyes to see millions of stars that represented his descendants.

The experience of faith projects light on our human existence and guides us toward our Source. Christ is the Light of the World who reveals God's love for us. If we feel an inner call to live in faith, we raise our eyes and begin our journey, like the Magi and men and women of faith who preceded us. Set in motion and guided by Christ, we can travel far and wide on our human adventure, farther than we can visualize on a path that leads to intimacy with God our Father.

We should not think that the Magi who followed their star were more fortunate than we are on our faith journey. Our signposts are real, meaningful, and our opportunities, modern. Some may wonder whether our questions and doubts could indicate a loss or lack of faith. These are merely invitations to raise our eyes beyond a faith that may have become comfortable and rediscover God in the battlefields of life.

The Magi relied on the Scriptures to guide them to the new-born king. Today we read the Gospel of Christ to enhance our quest for meaning. Our desire is to be inspired by something greater than what we currently experience. We raise our eyes and begin our journey, though it may be challenging. We are confident that the Lord will always guide us.
