*NEWS FROM THE ARCHDIOCESE: New COVID-19 Restrictions: No Religious Gatherings

New provincial COVID-19 restrictions came into effect on November 10. The entire province will be under Code Red Alert as of Thursday, November 12. Please be advised that there can be no gatherings of any size for weekday or Sunday Masses. No in-person services can take place for at least four weeks. The livestreaming of Masses is permitted, however, provided that parishes limit the number of persons to five (5). Gatherings for weddings or funerals are to be limited to five (5) people, socially distanced, plus the presider. PARISH NEWS:

- In compliance with the New COVID-19 Restrictions made by the government and the directives from the Archdiocese, as of today Thursday November 12, there will be no public masses in our two parishes until further notices.

- The Diocese has clarified that the churches must be closed to the public except for the livestreaming purposes.

- Fr. Peter will celebrate Mass daily in private with your requested Mass intentions.

- This Sunday, there will be no Mass livestreamed because Fr. Peter was asked to self isolate at this time, although his COVID-19 test result was negative.

- All Masses are cancelled until the further notice. Therefore, you can watch daily Mass, and Sunday Mass on TV, or through Facebook. You can receive the Holy Communion spiritually by saying this prayer:

"My Jesus, I believe that You are present in the Most Holy Sacrament. I love You above all things, and I desire to receive You into my soul. Since I cannot at this moment receive You sacramentally, come at least spiritually into my heart. I embrace You as if You were already there and unite myself wholly to You. Never permit me to be separated from You." Amen.

In addition, I encourage you to pray the Holy Rosary, the Divine Mercy for an end to the coronavirus pandemic and for the conversion of heart of all Christians, especially the loved ones in our parish.

November 29, 2020 First Sunday of Advent (B) Advent Experiences ...

What a delightful surprise! My nephew Joel has just informed us that he, along with his wife and two children, will join us for the Holidays. They found plane tickets that didn't cost an arm and a leg and will fly from Newfoundland to be with us. There are joyful expectations on both sides: from our Newfoundland cousins and our family in the Outaouais Region. According to the Roman missal, Advent is a period of joyful anticipation leading up to the feast of Christmas! What exactly is involved? Why does the Church have this annual celebration?



Preparing for Our Fulfillment ...

The Church has made Advent an important liturgical season to enlighten us about a fundamental element of our entire Christian life. We are moving beyond living in hope and faith, as promised in the Bible, to celebrating the fulfillment of God's promise. Realistically, Christians cannot remain *static* in the present time, as if everything has been given, completed and accomplished. Christians are always in the process of attaining their personal fulfillment. As St. Paul emphasizes: *Therefore, my beloved, be steadfast, immovable, always excelling in the work of the Lord, because you know that in the Lord your labor is not in vain* (1 Corinthians 15:58).

Christians are also actively pursuing an ultimate goal: one that will bring people of all nations to live in peace and harmony. The whole cosmos - galaxies, planets, astral dust – all are part of this journey towards fulfillment: For the creation waits with eager longing for the revealing of the children of God; for the creation was subjected to futility, not of its own will but by the will of the one who subjected it, in hope that the creation itself will be set free from its bondage to decay and will obtain the freedom of the glory of the children of God (Romans 8:19-21).)

Living free ... As we become aware of our "incomplete" state, it allows us to put into perspective what often monopolizes our energies: such as our houses, our cars and certain painful situations. Often these are perceived, not as absolutes, but as elements, steps in the long journey towards our fulfillment.

Watching and being attentive means...

We are watching and waiting for mutual joy: God is waiting for us and will flood us with his joy and life. As we wait, we pray with a word used by the first Christian communities: *Maranatha: Come Lord Jesus*. Come, our happiest blessing is your birth that we anticipated and which could only be accomplished by your will.

Watching means never forgetting that we are always on a progressive journey and that our lives have meaning.

Watching means that our individual existences are part of a great and beautiful project that started long before us and will continue after our time on earth.

Watching means that we acknowledge we are the *leaven* in our *human dough*. We must be the *leaven* that will transform our world.

Watching means being open to the many times that Christ comes into our lives and to his final coming that will complete the history of the world.
