Sacrament of Reconciliation:

Every week parishioners have the opportunity to receive the sacrament of Reconciliation on Fridays between 9:00 a.m. and 10:00 a.m. during the hour of adoration in the church. If you see the light on, at the confessional Fr. Peter is there; come and reconcile with God.

The Effects of the Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation:

The whole power of the sacrament of Penance consists in restoring us to God's grace and joining us with him in an intimate friendship. *Reconciliation with God* is thus the purpose and effect of this sacrament. For those who receive the sacrament of Penance with contrite heart and religious disposition, reconciliation 'is usually followed by peace and serenity of conscience with strong spiritual consolation.' Indeed, the sacrament of Reconciliation with God brings about a true 'spiritual resurrection', restoration of the dignity and blessings of the life of the children of God, or which the most precious is friendship with God.

This sacrament reconciles us with the Church. Sin damages or even breaks fraternal communion. The sacrament of Penance repairs or restores it. In this sense it does not simply heal the one restored to ecclesial communion but has also a revitalizing effect on the life of the Church which suffered from the sin of one of her members. (Ref. Sacrament of the Sick: (The anointing of the sick)

The purpose of the sacrament of the sick is to give special help to a Christian faced with the difficulties of a serious illness or old age. The Christian can receive the sacrament of the sick whenever he has a serious illness. It is the sacrament of the presence of the Lord with us in the moments of trial that are sickness or old age. The celebration of this sacrament consists in the laying of the hands of the priest and in the anointing of the Holy Oil of Chrism on the forehead and on the palms of the hands of the sick. Consecrated by the bishop during the annual Chrism Mass, the Holy Oil of Chrism brings strength and gentleness to the sick. It penetrates the skin, spreads its good smell, and strengthens the body.

With the laying of the hands, the anointing recalls the attention and tenderness of Jesus Christ toward sick people. One must not wait for a person to be on "his deathbed" before giving him this sacrament. In case of emergency, please contact the parish office at 204-379-2434 or Fr. Peter at 204-952-4531.

Choosing the narrow door

I want to share my thoughts about Frank. For more than twenty years, he was the concierge at a Marian sanctuary. Everyone knew and loved him. He always had a smile, was ready to help out and welcome people. He died a few months ago from cancer. I was among the privileged few who accompanied him in his last moments. In his room at the CHSLD [Long Term Care Facility], there was no radio, television or telephone. When I asked if I could bring a small CD player, he said, "I have everything I need here." All that he needed was his rosary and two prayer books.



Frank lived alone in Montreal. When we asked about his family, he answered: "I have my family: Jesus is my brother, Mary is my mother, God is my Father, and Brother André is my uncle!"

Frank gave all that he had; he was generous with his time and money. At his death, he did not even have a bank account.

At one point in his life, Frank chose Jesus Christ, entirely and exclusively. Jesus was his friend, his strength, his wealth, his joy and his guide. He followed Jesus through the narrow door of self-giving. While it may be an unpopular door, it opens onto a large field of freedom and joy.

At the moment of his death, Frank found the door of life wide open before him. This was normal for him since every day he was immersed in Christ's life, the one true Life.

Today I am certain that Frank is seated at the Lord's heavenly banquet. He is there along with the people whom he helped and who became part of his family. He was comfortable following Christ. His Uncle Brother André, could not refuse any miracle requested for his friends on earth.

Frank never chose the broad, seductive door that our world of consumption offers, one of escape from reality and one of self-worship. He chose the door called Jesus Christ. It's a narrow door that you only enter without "baggage". This door leads to true Life.
