### Sacrament of Reconciliation:

Parishioners will have the opportunity to receive the sacrament of Reconciliation on Fridays between 9:00 a.m. and 10:00 a.m. during the hour of adoration in the church. If you see the light on, at the confessional Fr. Peter is there; come and reconcile with God.

#### The Effects of the Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation:

The whole power of the sacrament of Penance consists in restoring us to God's grace and joining us with him in an intimate friendship. *Reconciliation with God* is thus the purpose and effect of this sacrament. For those who receive the sacrament of Penance with contrite heart and religious disposition, reconciliation 'is usually followed by peace and serenity of conscience with strong spiritual consolation.' Indeed, the sacrament of Reconciliation with God brings about a true 'spiritual resurrection', restoration of the dignity and blessings of the life of the children of God, or which the most precious is friendship with God.

This sacrament reconciles us with the Church. Sin damages or even breaks fraternal communion. The sacrament of Penance repairs or restores it. In this sense it does not simply heal the one restored to ecclesial communion but has also a revitalizing effect on the life of the Church which suffered from the sin of one of her members. (Ref. # CATECHISM AND PREPARATION FOR THE SACRAMENT OF FIRST RECONCILIATION, FIRST COMMUNION AND CONFIRMATION:

The parents of the Saint-Claude and Saint-Denis parishes who wish to undertake the catechism and preparation of their children for the sacrament of first Reconciliation (7-8 years of age or Grade 2), first Communion (8-9 year of age or Grade 3) or Confirmation (11-12 year of age or Grade 6 or more) are invited to contact La Paroisse de Saint-Claude (204-379-2434) during office hours or Fr. ### Sacrament of the Sick: (The anointing of the sick)

The purpose of the sacrament of the sick is to give special help to a Christian faced with the difficulties of a serious illness or old age. The Christian can receive the sacrament of the sick whenever he has a serious illness. It is the sacrament of the presence of the Lord with us in the moments of trial that are sickness or old age. The celebration of this sacrament consists in the laying of the hands of the priest and in the anointing of the Holy Oil of Chrism on the forehead and on the palms of the hands of the sick. Consecrated by the bishop during the annual Chrism Mass, the Holy Oil of Chrism brings strength and gentleness to the sick. It penetrates the skin, spreads its good smell, and strengthens the body.

With the laying of the hands, the anointing recalls the attention and tenderness of Jesus Christ toward sick people. One must not wait for a person to be on "his deathbed" before giving him this sacrament. In case of emergency, please contact the parish office at 204-379-2434 or Fr. Peter at 204-952-4531.

# Investing in Eternity

At this time of year, activities resume their normal rhythm and we pay more attention to our relationships. We want productive teams and stable associations, yet this may impose some limits on our spontaneity. We skillfully play our cards according to what we think the future will bring. It is wise to live with foresight and carefully weigh our interpersonal relationships. It is a mature way to proceed and helps maintain a peaceful climate in our living space. Yet if all our words and actions are calculated, life could become

toxic. Without spontaneity, calculation infiltrates everything and there is little point in building purely utilitarian relationships. The joy and the magic of existence disappear when a return on our investments is the only guide that we choose.

These reflections on our relationships make it possible to appreciate the revolution proposed by Christ two millennia ago. The norms Christ followed were those of a rural society dealing with scarcity and which was highly suspicious of all gratuities. Riveted to their plot of land or their fishing area, Jesus' contemporaries had to calculate every move. Any generosity received would expect repayment. Even marriages were economic pacts between families. There was no such thing as alliances based on preferences!

In the context of yesteryear, the seating at a festive meal indicated the importance in which the invitee was held. Each place reflected the level of honor accorded by the host to his guest. People would have checked to see if their assigned places suited their station in life. Jesus gave good advice when he pointed out the potential embarrassment of overestimating one's personal value, and the shaming when asked to move to a less desirable place. It would be preferable to be put in the spotlight by the host by being escorted to a more prestigious place in front of all the guests.

Jesus' flawless technique reflected the wisdom of his day. On the other hand, Jesus' proposal for the person who invited him is simply revolutionary. Jesus challenged the system of giving purely to be reimbursed. In a situation of scarcity, it's utopian. Finding happiness by giving something to people who cannot return the favor was a unique idea. Yet Christ's comments say much about God's generosity and opens up perspectives for eternity.

Before resuming our fall routines, remember the times when you received something from someone else for free. The best way to emulate the Gospel message today is to share your own generosity and not expect repayment. Living this Gospel message requires a good deal of trust in God. It is a good investment because God is the Source of all Generosity.
