28th Sunday in Ordinary Time (A)

Magnificent Wedding, Appropriate Attire!



Before commenting on this Sunday's Gospel, let's remember why St. Matthew and the other Evangelists wrote their Gospels. They didn't work for widely circulated newspapers or media channels! They remembered and recorded Christ's acts and words for their Christian communities.

A parable and a message ...

We are accustomed to the format Jesus used in his parables: a simple story and message with a thoughtful summary at the conclusion. In this parable, the message is clear. The Jewish people are invited to

attend the *wedding* between God and his people. The prophets Hosea, Isaiah and Ezekiel had already compared God's relationship with his people to a marriage. However, now Jesus' compatriots refuse to attend and celebrate this wedding. Then God sends his missionaries around the world to invite everyone, including Gentiles, to attend the ceremony and be part of this joyful celebration.

However, this *parable* is complicated and becomes an *allegory*. The story progresses, and as details and situations are included, we arrive at the teachable moment.

A quick reading of the text leads to inconsistencies. For example, though the meal is ready and the roast veal is on the table, the king assembles his troops, goes to war and sets fire to a city. Why even mention the meal? Yet, these details are included in St. Matthew's Gospel. They refer to the destruction and burning of Jerusalem in 70 AD. Upon reflection, readers learn why God *abandoned* his chosen people who had already given up on him and reached out to others

Choosing Christ ...

Now the king suddenly decides to invite everyone to his son's wedding and a crowd of people fill the wedding hall. No wonder some of them didn't have time to put on their wedding attire. So why then does the king blame one of them for not wearing "a wedding garment"? Why does he throw him out after inviting him?

In the ancient world, wearing specific attire identified a person's station in life. Military dress expressed a soldier's commitment to the service of the emperor. The Pharisees wore large fringes on their prayer shawls to show they followed the Law of Moses. Thus, a Christian would wear a "garment" to indicate his / her faithfulness to a relationship with God. However, that *garment* was not made of wool or cotton, but of adherence to the teachings and actions that Christ demonstrated throughout his life:

As God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, meekness, and patience (Col 3:12)
