During this second week of the 2024 Good Shepherd Campaign, we invite you to visit the Archdiocese's website to watch the video of Archbishop LeGatt and our five seminarians (click here).

The cost to support a seminarian is about \$45,000 per year. This includes accommodation and food, tuition, medical insurance and a monthly stipend. For international seminarians, it is also a question of legal fees and transportation to bring him from abroad. At least

twice during his studies, we pay for a trip home to see his family.

The cost to bring in an international priest is about \$20,000. This cost includes legal fees, travel, two and a half months' salary paid by the Archdiocese during his enculturation, language classes if needed, and an allowance for him to stock up on supplies for his first winter here.

We also invite you to discern in prayer to support the Good Shepherd Campaign 2024, because priests play a vital role in the Life of the Church. It is important that we continue to support international seminarians and priests in their vocations.

This year we have five seminarians from Vietnam and Congo. Please find on the back table - pamphlets introducing our seminarians, donation cards, envelopes and a letter from Mgr. Albert LeGatt. * SAVE THE DATE!!! Jubilee 2025 - Pilgrims of Hope - December 29, 2024




The Jubilee Year 2025 will begin with the opening of the Holy Door of St. Peter's Basilica on Christmas Eve, December 24, 2024. On December 29th, the Holy Door of the Archbasilica of St. John Lateran, the Cathedral of Rome, will also be opened by the Holy Father. On this same day, every Cathedral and co-Cathedral worldwide will celebrate a special Mass, presided over by the local Bishop, to mark the beginning of the Jubilee.

To mark this significant event, Archbishop Albert LeGatt, D.D. will celebrate Mass on December 29th, 2024, at 3:00 p.m. at the Saint Boniface Cathedral. All are invited to join in the opening of the

Jubilee Year. Save the date!

A Brief Introduction - As we move closer to the Jubilee of 2025, Pope Francis wants 2024 to be dedicated to prayer. Thus, he is inviting the whole Church to a time of intense commitment in preparation for the Opening of the Holy Door at St. Peter's in Rome, on December 24.

The Jubilee will involve not only the city of Rome, but will extend far beyond, as God's mercy is proclaimed to the whole world, thus

becoming a great opportunity for evangelization. As Christians, we are invited to bear witness as authentic "Pilgrims of Hope" walking toward the Lord, who opens his merciful and forgiving arms to us, as well as to our brothers and sisters who are still waiting for the Gospel to be proclaimed to them.

Prepared by the Vatican's Dicastery for Evangelization, "Teach Us to Pray", is a resource aide, inspired by the magisterium of Pope Francis, intended to be used by the faithful during this time of preparation for the opening of the Holy Door. It is an invitation to intensify prayer as a personal dialogue with God.

* Tips for Family Prayer

One of the main places where families gather is the dinner table, a powerful opportunity to pray together as a family, thanking the Lord for what we have received and praying for those most in need. Another opportune time is when children rise from bed, or go to bed. A short prayer in the morning and a thankful prayer at night help children recognize the blessings received from the Lord. Finally, on Sunday mornings before Mass, families can pray **Morning Lauds** from the **Liturgy of the Hours**. Children can learn to connect to the Psalms, begin to read short Bible passages and, if a family member plays a musical instrument, accompany this public prayer of the Church with hymns.

Today, the Gospel presents Jesus Christ as the Master, who speaks to us about the detachment which we must live by. In the first place, a detachment of our honor and recognition which, every so often, we are looking for: "Beware of... accept greetings in the marketplaces, seats of honor in synagogues, and places of honor at banquets" (cf. Mk 12:38-39). In this sense, Jesus prevents us from following the bad example of the scribes.

In the second place, detachment of material things. Jesus Christ praises the widow while regretting at the same time, the deceit of the others: "For they have all contributed from their surplus wealth, but she, from her poverty, has

contributed all she had, her whole livelihood." (Mk 12:44)

He who does not live the detachment of worldly things does live full of his own ego and is incapable of loving. In such a state of mind there is no "room" for others: neither compassion nor leniency or understanding towards our neighbor.

Saints provide us with examples. Here is a fact of Saint Pius X's life, when he still was the bishop of Mantua. A merchant wrote slanders against the bishop. Many friends advise him to sue the slanderer, but the future Pontiff replied: "This poor soul is more in need of prayer than of punishment." He did not indict him; he prayed for him.

But that was not the end of it; after a while, this merchant went bankrupt. All creditors fell on him, and he lost everything. Only one person helped him out: it was the very same bishop of Mantua who, anonymously, sent him an envelope with some money, by saying that it was coming from the most Compassionate Lady, that is, from Our Lady of Perpetual Help.

Do I truly live the detachment of the earthly realities? Is my heart empty of things? Can my heart become aware of others' needs? "The program of a Christian —the program of Jesus—is a 'heart that sees'" (Benedict XVI).
